



Bushfire Safety Management Plan

A plan to guide Staff and Guests in the conduct of camps and programs dependent on the weather conditions during the Bushfire Season.

Prepare. Act. Survive.

<u>Prepare</u>

Good preparation and management procedure allow us to continue to conduct programs in the Bushfire Season.

Well Prepared Participants

- Staff training on emergency procedures is conducted regularly.
- Guests will be thoroughly briefed on bushfire safety, prevention and the emergency procedures.

Comprehensive Procedures

- A Bushfire / Activity Safety Matrix that has predetermined trigger points for action (see attached).
- Development (with local Emergency Services) of comprehensive Emergency management Plans.
- Robust Communication systems allow information flow with participants.
- Procedures in place to receive warning of changed conditions from Rural Fire Service and Early Warning Network.

<u>Act</u>

Preparation has us ready to enact an Emergency Management Plan at any time of increased fire danger.

Comprehensive Plans

- Evacuation and Emergency response procedures are in place if ever required. These include but are not limited to:
 - Transport Plans
 - o 24 hour communications with all groups
 - Measures taken to reduce fire risk to buildings and provide safer place inside buildings.
- Safer Places (Emergency Refuges) have been identified on out trips if evacuation were not practical.
- Bushfire survival plans maintained to current State Bush Fire Service publications and recommendations.

Survive

Good planning and preparation will provide the opportunity to enter the Australian Bush for your Camp or Activity with the knowledge that your safety has been comprehensively considered.


Our Commitment:

Fire Danger Rating

The Fire Danger Rating (FDR) indicates the expected Fire Behaviour on a given day. The FDR is determined by the Fire Danger Index (FDI), which is determined by a combination of air temperature, relative humidity, wind speed and drought factors.

An FDI of 1 indicates that a fire will not burn, or will burn so slowly that it can easily be controlled. A FDI in excess of 100 (FDR is Catastrophic / Code Red) means that any fire that starts will burn so fats and hot that it is uncontrollable.



When a Fire Danger Rating is advised, you need to take it seriously and be prepared to act.

We display the current FDR near the Dining Room.

Your survival may depend on it.

Total Fire Ban

A Total Fire Ban may be declared for days of increased fire danger, based on advice from the Bureau of Meteorology.

Fire Danger Ratings and Total Fire Bans are generally issued for Fire Districts.

RULES FOR WHEN A TOTAL FIRE BAN HAS BEEN DECLARED

Camp Oasis is in the Central Fire District. When a TFB has been declared it will be displayed near the Dining Room.

There will be:

No Campfires. Gas BBQ is permitted with running water and adult supervision. All Guests and Staff will be briefed on procedures in the event that a fire starts in the vicinity
